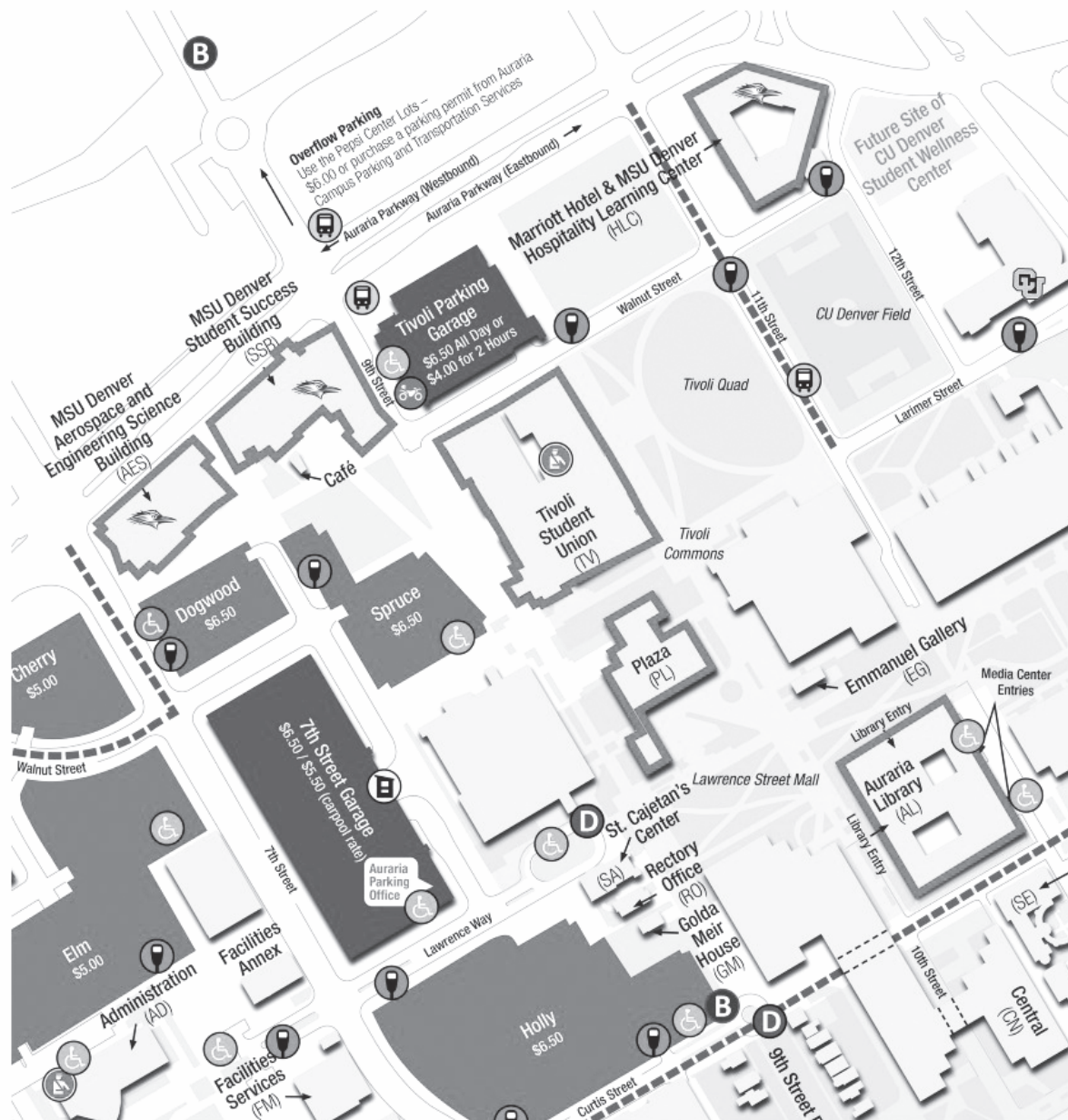

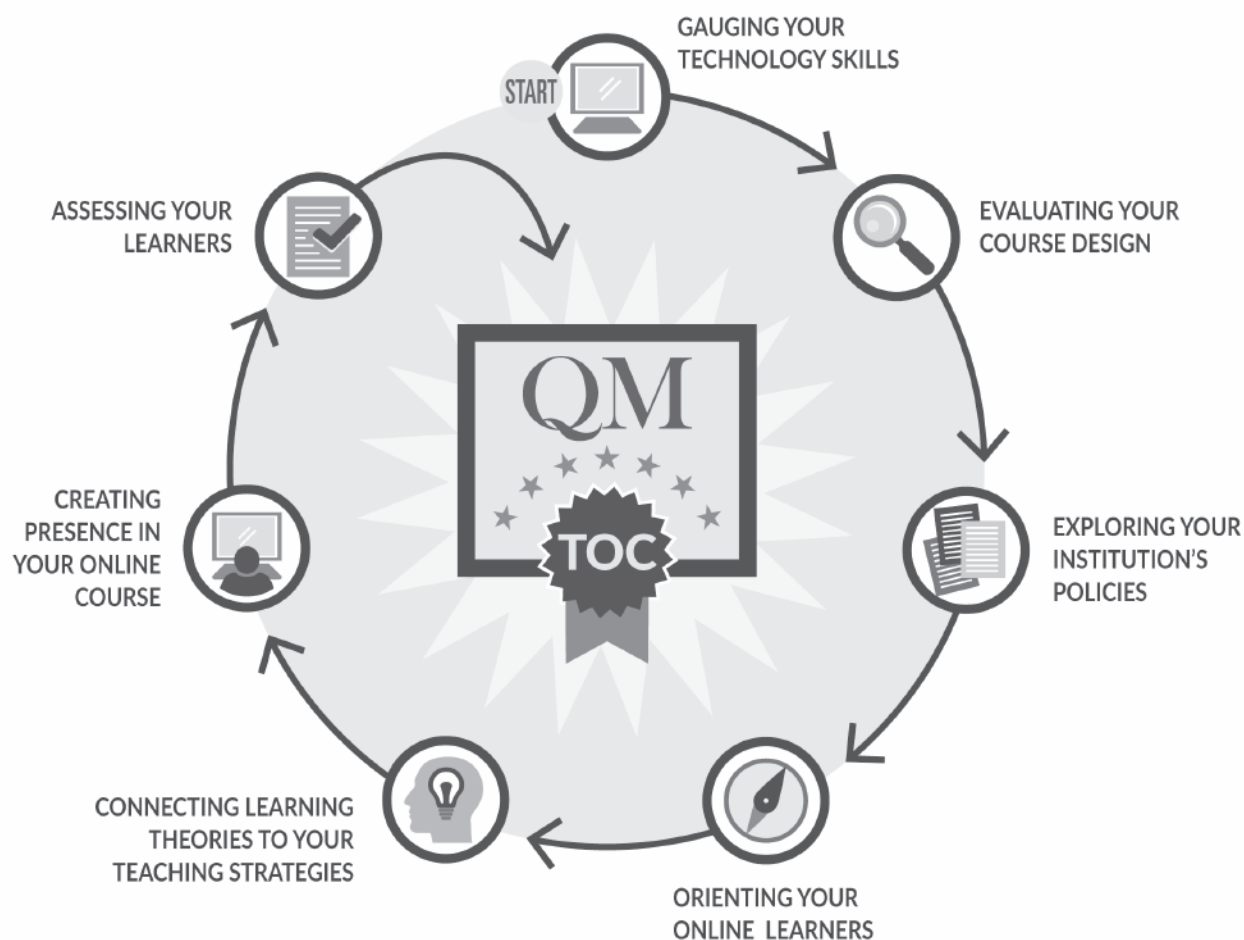

Since 2016, the number of courses offered online at SCSU has grown; thus, a robust quality assurance structure is needed. Preliminary data for online education in the Minnesota State System partly drove the effort, as did survey data collected from faculty who had completed a Quality Matters training. We will share the steps we took, the challenges we faced, and the small wins we celebrated.
